# RECLAIMING HISTORY

We recognize that the rich history and former lives of this place come with a price of settlement, violence, slavery, and hardship. As a privately owned iron furnace in the 1800s, the original Caroline Furnace operated on slave labor. Prior to that, this fertile land was colonized by Europeans and taken from the Native Americans who called it home.

Rather than hiding or ignoring the past, let's explore and learn from it. We do this not to create division, but as a reminder that we all fall short of the glory of God. Santayana and Churchill claimed that history forgotten is history repeated; let's remember those who came before us and use their stories as a reminder to love one another as Jesus taught us.

Some passionate individuals have helped us uncover parts of our story. We are working to piece together the story more thoroughly so we can share it. Our hope is to reclaim a historic 19th century cemetery on property and verify the families and slaves who are buried here. As part of this project, we'll be working closely with our local Ruritan Club and other volunteers to create a memorial path that includes the cemetery.

### SUSTAINABILITY PLAN

As an organization promoting faith, education, and renewal in God's creation, we've been discerning how to make Caroline Furnace a more environmentally sustainable organization. It is our aim to continue seeking ways to better serve the Lord and our communities in ways that are feasible for our staff, meaningful to our retreat groups, and educational to our campers and students.

Some of our current practices include waste reduction, property and facility improvements, and "unlittering." Goals for growth in 2019 include further waste reduction through composting and limiting single use plastics, group recycling, and education in all of our facilities, more local sourcing of foods and camp store items, and improved energy efficiency. Our long range goals include incorporating pollinator gardens and foodscaping, as well as adding a large garden to the field by the Farmhouse.




This place continues to shape the faith and personal growth of so many people of all ages through retreat groups, youth groups, outdoor education, volunteer work crews, summer campers, and staff. This year, we fully lived the ELCA theme of *This Changes Everything*:

- Tom Powell was installed as Executive Director on January 31 and officially began on February 1, 2018.
- We welcomed Lee Ann as our Food Service Director, Ron as a new Maintenance employee, and LuAnn as our Bookkeeper.
- As the year ended, we celebrated the retirement of our long-time
- · Office Manager, Dolly Woodward.
- Rev. Heidi David-Young began work in December as the Director of Resource & Program Development.
- Board members Mark Hartman and Robin Prinz were recognized for their six years of service in helping lead this organization.
- We welcomed new Board members Amy Chelgreen and Tori Smith.

Overall, operations and daily activities are moving at a surprisingly busy pace and have improved with the year ending on positive trends in all areas of *faith*, *education*, *and renewal*. 2018 was a year of growth in many areas - summer campers, Caroline Furnace retreats, rental groups, and volunteer engagement. This growth resulted in significant property improvements, critical infrastructure repairs, a number of new program offerings, and sustained high quality hospitality for all of our guests.

This was a second consecutive financially stable year, with controlled expenses and sustained income growth. The greatest increases are in overall giving, rental income, and the Virginia Synod pledged subsidy. Expenses are down in maintenance, utilities, and office and summer program operations, which helped balance out our growth in year round staff. The value of targeted donations and volunteer labor hours designated for improvements cannot be overstated and are a key factor in our current stability.

#### An extra special thank you to our donors for the wastewater treatment plant project:

Targeted fundraising for renovations to our wastewater treatment plant went incredibly well and we exceeded our intial goal of the project estimate. This was a very important infrastructure update and was critical in continuing usage of the Cabin Village and Sukkah Village. We were blessed with 21 individuals and 11 congregations who responded to our special request, providing donations ranging from \$100 to \$15,000 dedicated to this project, which **totaled \$64,370**.

Our **regular operational giving** continues to reveal slow, steady growth. In addition to the gifts for the wastewater treatment plant renovation, we received donations from 120 individuals and 50 organizations. 25% of our current donors have pledged to give on a weekly, monthly, or quarterly basis, which provides additional consistency and confidence in our growth. Operational giving for 2018 totaled \$104,152.

**In-kind donations** this year included a solar panel at the lake, outdoor equipment, tools, craft supplies, cleaning and paper products, postage for quarterly mailers, two large dry erase boards, digital cameras, new bedding for the Farmhouse, new cabinets and appliances for the residence kitchen, and new flooring for the apartment. The total estimated value is \$10,200.
